It was an interesting starting point of my research. I started exploring a connection between language, data and I wanted to make this act more transparent. Show people what actually they are sharing with the world. First project I did was called Edentity, it was an installation that asked users to login into their book account through an on-sight computer that was connected to a printer. I wrote a custom book app, that once people logged into, would prompt a printer to automatically start printing a booklet with their private information. From photos and likes to places they have vigited, extracts of their private chats to deeply secure

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such as login sessions, all of this data was presented systematically in a printed document and handed to them. I was hoping to arouse some concern through this project and spark some debates around privacy and accessibility. The idea was that people will stop for a minute and think about sharing all those Instead, it became a kind of social act itself: people were surprisingly excited to print their albums, swap them with their friends or even call friends and family to share their login details, so they could print it for them. It was different from was I expected, but I learned that people won't stee creating content, so I started looking for a part where our data is most vulnerable. One thing that immediately got my attention when I was going through archives of leaked documents was a vast list of what at first looked like random word These random were actually filters. So called "Spook words" that help security agencies to isolate high-value online traffic and to spot potential s. Every time you write one of these words a little alert triggers and the more you use them, the better chance you have on becoming a target of exercises by an individual agent. For my final project I made a font that automatically strikes through so called words as they are written. All you have to do is to install this font as any other font on your computer and it can be used in any popular software such as Illustrator, Indesign, Word or in a browser. It is used normally to write text as any other font does, but once one of these trigger words is written - the font automatically crosses it out.

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
